THE SECONDARY SCHOOLS UNITED NATIONS SYMPOSIUM AWARDS MLIS

Model United Nations, is an annual symposium that has taken place in Montreal Quebec for the last 17 years. It is one of the largest UN Conferences in North America with thousands of school teams coming together to simulate the activities that take place in the United Nations. Here, they are educated about civics, current events, public speaking and communication, globalisation and multi-lateral dependency. Students take on roles as diplomats and participate in simulated sessions of an IGO (intergovernmental organisation) or a deliberate body.



Maple Leaf International School (MLIS) has with great pride, represented our country at the SSUNS, (Secondary Schools United Nations Symposium) , conference for a number of years. This year the trip took place from the 11th to the 14th of November, with about 15 students participating. The theme was, "Defining our New Decade." Students studied the parliamentary operations of the United Nations. They learned about world issues and developed their legal

and debating skills. They studied the aspects of the global economy that will experience change in the coming years, and also considered the responses that can be provided to the future challenges the human race will face. These include natural disasters to a shortage of resources versus the expanding population - all factors that will make the Millennium Development Goals more challenging. Earlier this year, SSUNS awarded Maple Leaf International School the 2010 International School scholarship award for the second year in a row. In giving the award, the organisation indicated that, "we found your school's achievements to be extraordinary and having shown true excellence at Secondary Schools United Nations Symposium .

The Model United Nations involves representatives from schools throughout the world, and we are justifiably proud about receiving this award. Further Mr. Bill Hargreaves the school's principal states, the team work, the determination, and the thinking capabilities that entice students to apply for this event, as well, as the tremendous work that is done in preparation for making a strong contribution in Montreal, is well recognized and appreciated. As a school, we are extremely proud of our team. Delegates at the Model UN are offered many opportunities that may help them

advance their education and choose their career path, such as tours of McGill University. Although it is a lot of work, all the students were willing to put in massive amounts of time and effort to be able to reach their goals.

For this year's November symposium students have had to prepare and submit preliminary positions papers and represented Portugal, Seychelles and Libya. They were also assigned a position on the Security Council and were assigned as representatives to re-enact two historical crisis committees: European Council, Spanish Civil War and FEMA. "Involvement in the Model United Nations programme clearly raises student International awareness" says Ms. Duplisea, one of the faculty advisers. Mr. Seguin another teacher is proud of the work his students have accomplished and the recognition that this team of 20 delegates has received. Congratulations to the team.

Students applying to University and College are reminded that the deadline for applications to overseas schools is mid January. Applications to the Trinidad Schools may be sent in February.

All students returning to Maple Leaf in September should have completed their option sheet with choices for 2010-2011. The actual decision about course offerings will be made in February when stu-

dent and staff numbers are finalized. The timetable will then be built and in April students will be contacted if there are conflicts in their schedules.

Students are strongly encouraged to begin review and study for exams the beginning of January. The actual exam or culminating activity represents 30% of the final mark and this can allow a student to greatly improve the final mark.

MAGNIFICENT LEARNING EXPERIENCE AT PRIMARY

Mrs. Hoyte's Kindergarten's class at Maple Leaf International School recently studied a unit on "real" and "imaginary" bears which was integrated into the curriculum. The children learned about the eight different species of bears and also discovered that the Red Panda and Koala bears are not actually bears. In fact, they are not even related to bears. The Red Panda is a member of the skunk family and the koala bear is a marsupial. They learned of the various characteristics of real and imaginary bears and did a project on each bear which they presented during a show-and-tell class.

As part of their Language Arts program, the children read stories and poems and discussed the similarities and differences between them. They also wrote stories and drew pictures to illustrate their stories. The students incorporated drama as they reenacted the stories, "Where's My Teddy?" and "Goldilocks and the

Three Bears." During their Math unit they graphed their favourite bears and bear stories, created and extended patterns with bears, tallied, sorted and played bingo bears. For their Social Studies unit, they used a giant sized world map on which they located the different regions where bears are found and stuck pictures to illustrate. They created art projects at the art centre and learned many bear songs and games which they sang during music classes and played during our physical education classes. As an extension of the unit and culminating activity, they participated in a Build-a-Bear workshop where each child was given the opportunity to build their very own bear. Each bear received his very own home and birth certificate.

On returning to school the children celebrated with their teddies at a Grand Teddy Bears' Picnic, where they tasted honey and ate marmalade sandwiches,

Paddington Bear's favourite food. They read bear stories and sang the Teddy Bears Picnic song along with many other bear songs.

This was an enjoyable unit and a truly magnificent learning experience which we know these young children will never forget. What a spectacular way to learn!

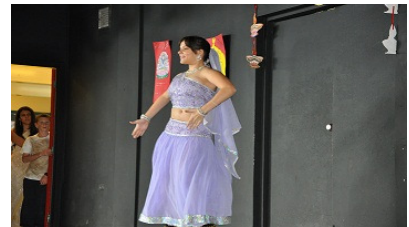
