Diploma: O.S.S.D
Ontario Secondary School Diploma (total of 30 credits) 40 hours of community service if at MLIS for 4 years of high school or 10 hours per year of attendance. All students, regardless of year of admission must successfully complete the Ontario Ministry of Education Literacy test.

GENERAL GUIDE FOR UNIVERSITY / COLLEGE ADMISSION

United Kingdom—Information to Know

The Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) is a central agency which acts on behalf of UK universities and colleges of higher education. All applications to courses at these institutions are made through UCAS and should be received by UCAS between September and mid-December for places for courses starting the following October. Late applications can be received up to 30 June, but there will be fewer vacant places left at the universities, so choice will be severely limited.

Applicants choose up to 6 choices universities / courses and enters them on the UCAS application form. No order of preference is indicated.

UCAS records the details of each application on computer and sends a copy of the form to each university listed on it.

Each university considers the application, may require an interview with the applicant and decides on the offer of a place. This is usually conditional on the number of points achieved in "A/AS" level examinations (results published during the third week of August each year).

UCAS lets the applicant know the decision of each university.

When all universities have replied, candidates can accept a maximum of 2 offers—a first choice with an optional “insurance” choice.

Applicants who do not get a place or who apply late (after 01 July) are eligible to enter the final stage of the application process, Clearing. In Clearing applicants are given vacancy information by UCAS and may negotiate direct with institutions.

Qualification requirements

QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED to gain access to higher education will vary from institution to institution and from course to course.

Undergraduate Studies

Institutions will be able to advise as to admissions requirements for particular courses. An offer of a place on a course will often be conditional on achieving certain grades in certain subjects.

An institution may ask for a certain number of UCAS points for admission onto a course.

The Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) site contains information about how your existing qualifications fit into the UCAS tariff. www.UCAS.com

The UCAS tariff is a points system used to report achievement for entry to higher education (HE) in a numerical format.

It establishes agreed equivalences between different types of qualifications and provides comparisons between applicants with different types and volumes of achievement.

The site also contains pre-HE UK Qualifications information.

This provides up-to-date information about a wide range of pre-HE qualifications and entry routes to HE.

This information relates to students with UK and International qualifications.

Comparing qualifications

Information for international students wanting to see how their qualifications compare to those in a country they wish to study or work in can be obtained from National Academic Recognition Centres (NARIC) and / or the European Network of Information Centres (ENIC).

Grade 12 Secondary School Diploma (university level courses) is considered comparable to the overall GCE Advance / Scottish Advanced High standard) (6 grade 12 U, U/C or M courses including grade 12 English – U level).

Admission is through the University and colleges Admission Services (UCAS) requirements include:

- Two A-levels at Grade E or above.
- The more famous the university the higher the grades required.
